Tn our household we have a family of six. Tiffany works part time Las an English teacher and our four children; Kennedy, Lucas,



Jacob, and Matthew keep us moving from one activity to another during the summer months. As a result, there are checks written for registration fees for baseball, tennis shoes to replace the old shoes with holes, and piano lessons. The credit card is used to fill the car up with gas to transport kids to activities and occasionally take a family

camping trip. Families that pay the rent or a mortgage put a plan in place for monthly bills and expenses. When employed, one looks to the next possible raise to help ease the financial burden of the continuous incoming expenses. When a raise does not happen, a family is forced to buckle down and live within their existing means for another year.

The Mineral Point School District worked hard this past year and was successful by many measures, but unfortunately, the District did not receive a raise this year from the state to operate schools. As a result of an unfavorable budget for school funding, Mineral Point Schools are forced to buckle down and live within their existing means for another year.

However, living within last year's means should not mean limiting the District's ability to grow, raise expectations, or create new offerings. For next school year, the District carefully reprioritized existing funds to best meet the needs for most of our students next year.

A result of reprioritizing existing funds finds the district accomplishing all of the above while reducing overall expenditures by more than \$60,000 over last year. Although many priorities are pending a funding source for next year, the district has done well given the current financial situation. 🏖

State Aid Update

The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction released its preliminary state aid estimates for 2015-16 Wednesday, July 1.

The Mineral Point Unified School District is projected to see a state aid decrease of 6.84%, or \$331,411 compared to general aid last year.

When comparing Mineral Point to its surrounding districts, and those in Iowa County, the following numbers are available:

Barneveld: Up 2.77%, or \$70,282 Highland: Down 2.31%, or \$53,498 Belmont: Down 3.05%, or \$67,493 lowa-Grant: Up 3%, or \$166,741 Dodgeville: Up 5.86%, or \$376,950 Pecatonica: Up 8.67%, or \$202,193

More than half of the state's public school districts are in the same boat as Mineral Point and will receive less general funding, according to these esti-

Of the states 424 districts, 55% will receive less money.

Even though the state budget is not finalized, the DPI is required by law to issue these preliminary numbers July 1.

Using the most recent estimates, the biennial budget maintains the same level of general school aid (\$4.476 billion) as was appropriated in the 2014-15 fiscal year. Actual aid payments are estimated at \$4.346 billion because of statutory reductions for the Milwaukee voucher program and for independent 2R charter schools.

With school aid being held at the same level as the prior year, other factors such as property valuation, enrollment, and shared costs in the general equalization aid formula impact whether the aid estimate for a district increases or decreases.

State wide, the district that is set to see the largest decrease in funding is Spooner, dropping 29.49%, or \$240,985.

The largest increase belongs to the Turtle Lake district at 71.17%, or \$255,859.

"Less state aid simply transfers the burden to local property taxpayers forcing their hand to pay for the states shortfall," said Mineral Point Superintendent Dr. Luke Francois. "To compound the matter, none of the increases to property taxes is passed on to schools because, for the first time in history, the school district receives zero dollars in new revenue to operate schools. With everything costing more this year than last year for property owners and schools, this is truly a lose-lose state budget for the Mineral Point community."

On October 15, the DPI will certify general state aid amounts for 2015-16 based on audited 2014-15 data. Estimated general aid to districts may change, although Francois doesnt expect much change in Mineral Point by the time the School Board certifies the levy in the fall.

It is important to note the July 1 estimates do not include per pupil categorical aid, which will be based on student membership from a three year rolling average of the 2015-16, 2014-15, and 2013-14 school years and their third Friday in September count. This aid will be paid in March 2016. The current budget appropriates \$127 million for that aid, which is \$150 per pupil, the same amount as last year.

The Mineral Point School Board passed a preliminary budget at its June 8 meeting and François said these July 1 estimates are in line with the projections from that meeting. *****

Music and Culture Class Offered

Mineral Point High School juniors and seniors with a minimum 3.25 grade point average were presented with a new opportunity this year to earn college credits.

Music instructor Matt Nevers taught a class entitled "Music and Culture" which served as a chance for students to obtain dual credit on their transcripts at both Mineral Point High School and UW-Oshkosh. The UWO credits can then transfer to nearly any college of the students' choosing.

"Dr. Francois approached me last year about this opportunity, which is a rare one as the teachers who are accepted into this program need to have a Master's degree in their specific teaching field, which I have," said Nevers.

His syllabus and curriculum must be approved by the university in order for the class to qualify.

Nevers is then a paid adjunct professor through UW-Oshkosh and this program is run through the state's Course Options system, which allows students to take up to two college courses without cost to the student.

The difference between this college credit offering and that of an Advanced Placement course is the AP college credit is not automatically quaranteed upon earning a passing grade in the course, as is the case here. In AP, a student must take a national lege," said Nevers. "This is a great expeexam and score a 3 or better (on a 5 point scale) to earn college credit. There is no rience to become college ready." such exam for Nevers' class.

This coming school year, the Mineral Point District will be part of the BOOST Telepresence Consortium with Pecatonica, Highland, Kickapoo, and Riverdale school districts. It is thought this Music and Culture course will be one of the offerings, allowing this opportunity to be available to students in four other districts as well.

Not only does telepresence allow other schools to get in on the action, but it enables our own students right here in Mineral Point the ability to take the course, because as of right now, there are not enough Pointer students signed up to run the course next school year as a standalone without telepresence.

Nevers wants to stress this class is not just for band or choir students. Most students in Symphony Orchestra and a stop at college are required to take a Music Appreciation course in order to fulfill a graduation requirement, therefore, students now have the option to get that out of the way while still in high school and save valuable tuition money while doing it.

Caleb Mitchell and Kaylee Sparks are the two juniors who completed the class this

Both students said the course was an adjustment for them as it was quite intensive with listening exams, tests, and writing.

Some topics covered included: North American Indian Music, Early Folk Music, American Opera, Musical Theatre, Ragtime, Jazz, Blues, Swing, Latin-Caribbean, Country, Rock and Roll, Gospel, Disco, Punk, Hip Hop, Pop, and other varieties.



Mitchell stated his favorite was the Early American Music with Sparks liking the Jazz and Rock and Roll.

One of the big projects of the class was a research paper that could focus on any American classical, jazz, or Broadway composer.

"It's my opinion that students can never write enough when preparing for col-

Sparks and Mitchell both agreed their grades improved over time in the course, once they became accustomed to the more rigorous standards.

"I learned quickly that it was much better to study as I went instead of trying to cram for an exam," said Sparks.

The students were rewarded for their hard work with a trip to see the Chicago Gino's East Pizzeria.

Mitchell enjoyed the class so much he is planning on re-taking the course next year as Nevers has indicated the subject matter will vary.

Sparks and Mitchell both encourage others to take advantage of the chance to earn college credit.

"It really is a different and fun opportunity," Mitchell said. 🏖

Mineral Point defeated second place Wolf River Lutheran 424-361 to earn the championship. Other teams in their conference included Oconto Falls, Turtle Lake, and Rio.

The other team conference champions around the state included Grantsburg, Potosi, Unity, and Boscobel.

The Pointers also had a successful showing at state, placing fifth as a team. Boscobel won the title.

The Wisconsin State High School Clay Target League stated 255 registered student athletes participated in the 2015 State Tournament on June 6th at the WTA Shooting Complex in Rome

Student-athletes representing 22 Wisconsin high school teams competed for overall team and individual achievements in Novice, Junior Varsity and Varsity classifications.

In the Varsity category, Ottoway shot a 92 and Ley 81. In the Junior Varsity field, Joe Ripp fired a 95, Ryan Welsh 81, and Jacob Moellers 75. In the Novice section, Garrett Faull scored 85, Brady Roberts 71, Steffes 71, and Milo Wong 67.

Ripp won the state title by placing first in the Junior Varsity Male category. Faull was second in the state in the Novice Male category. Steffes tied for fourth in the Novice Female category. Ottoway was fifth in the Varsity Male group.

Ripp was also honored for shooting 25 targets in a row at the state tournament and received a special patch.

The MP team used the Jonesdale Sportsman's Club as its home site and were guided under the leadership of volunteer coaches Bob Ley, Randy Ley, and Don Dobson.

Ottoway was the senior leader of the team and says shooting competition trap takes "a lot more skill than a normal person would think."

Prior to this season, the only trap he ever shot was with friends in the backyard. But Ottoway loves hunting and thought it would be fun to try since it involves shooting.



Adding to the special feeling of this season was the fact he used his Grandpa Ottoway's Winchester Model 12 he purchased in 1945. "The gun may not be a trap gun, but I sure shot it very well," he said.

As for the team as a whole, "The team did do really well. We got seven trophies up at the state tournament and I thought that was very good for how small the team we had was and for it being our first year."

Ottoway is also excited he has found a life-long sport. "Being on the trap team has started my whole career of trapshooting. Right now I am in the spring league down in Jonesdale and I plan on doing the fall league and to keep on shooting for years to come."

The girls claimed the WIAA Division 2 state team title in thrilling fashion at UW-La Crosse.




On the road to state, both boys and girls teams earned SWC Conference and WIAA Regional titles. The girls also claimed the WIAA Sectional team championship.

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Jeanette Galle

Teanette Galle is proof life can take some pretty great unexpected turns when you're least expecting them.

"I didn't have a plan — I just wanted to learn as much as I could," is a statement of Jeanette's that has served her well.

From backpacking through Portugal, to living in Israel for a short time, she has always taken full advantage of life's opportunities as they've presented themselves.

Growing up in the small mining town of Crumlin in South Wales in the United Kingdom, it was likely Jeanette Roach never envisioned she would be retiring as Jeanette Galle, a special education teacher in Mineral Point, Wisconsin, United States of America.

"When I told my family I was coming to Darlington, Wisconsin, we couldn't even find it on the map. My brother had to go to the library. This was pre-internet you know," she laughed.

Always valuing education, she earned her degree in history, geography, and social studies from the University of London.

Working as an Assistant Head of House, which resembles a guidance counselor here in the United States, in a huge downtown London 6th-12th grade school, she applied for the prestigious Fulbright Scholar Program and was accepted.

"I wanted to come to the United States to see what the education system was like," she said.

She was one of only seven from Britain accepted in 1982. While the other six went to much larger cities, Jeanette learned her new home would be in rural Darlington, Wisconsin as one of their social studies teachers, Jeanne Tierney, was accepted as well. The two would trade places.

After her three months as a Redbird, she returned to the UK, but maintained close ties with her new friends, including the Galle family.

Joe and Margaret both worked at the school and she would come back to visit, eventually meeting Joe's brother, Gary, getting to know each other over spaghetti dinners.

In 1985, she returned permanently and the two were married

Her United States teaching career began at Platteville middle and high schools as a history and world cultures teacher. She also went back to school to obtain her Master's in emotional, behavioral, and learning disabilities.

While raising two young daughters, Katie and Mari, who would both go on to graduate from MPHS, she taught at Highland for five years in history and special education and then made her way to Mineral Point in 1996. Minus one year where she taught in Dodgeville, she has been a Pointer ever since.

Over her career, she has seen many changes to special education.

"Services in special education have evolved since the 1980s when laws were enacted to protect students with special needs and inclusion began," she said. "When I started, kids were bused to other districts that had programs if their home school didn't. Now, most everyone is educated in their home district."

Jeanette credits her husband, Gary, retired guidance counselor at Mineral Point, for helping to make great advances for the special education population, as well as the former administrative team of Ted Evans and Jeff Gruber.

"They did so much for special ed people," she said. "However, they did it quietly. They made sure special ed students were fully included, including with the design plans for this building, and really set the tone for acceptance."

Ironically, Jeanette's current classroom was Gary's office when he retired just a few years ago.

Jeanette is very active with the Redruth, Cornwall student exchange program. Her efforts with this group helped to earn her the recognition of Cousin Jenny of the Year by the Southwest Wisconsin Cornish Society. She also works very hard with the Mineral Point Community Chest for over 20 years.

She has big aspirations for the future of special education in Mineral Point.

"I hope the programs will remain strong — with all the changes of staff, I hope everyone will be provided with the resources they need to be successful."

She is viewed as a veteran leader by many fellow staff members, but recognizes she couldn't have achieved success alone.

"It takes a team — everyone has to be a part of the team," she said. "The learning supporters (assistants) are trained and perform tasks that are not easy. We've had good support from administration. We've been fortunate to have stability--people have stayed; they know the children for years. Our students' parents have also been wonderful. They come to meetings and want only the best for their children. All of this only works if you have everyone working together."

"Only the best is good enough for every child," she added. "We worked to raise the bar with the goal for every student to work or go to college after graduation. This made me most proud."

Her Welsh accent will surely be missed by many in the hall-ways, and she will miss teaching as well.

"Every day I came to school was a gift." 🕏
