

## Principal's Post

### School Design Matters



One of the highlights of the current school year is our renovated elementary building. What each person appreciates when asked about the addition and upgrade is personal. For example, the students have commented about how much they enjoy the new gymnasium and library media center. (Our physical education teachers and library staff agree!) Teachers and staff

have noticed the improved air quality and temperature controls, the windows and the flooring in the cafeteria, and the increased space in our classrooms.

This project was needed from a physical standpoint. What about from a teaching and learning perspective? Studies have found that a more modern school design can translate into improved academic outcomes.

As an example, Prakash Nair, author of “Blueprint for Tomorrow: Redesigning Schools for Student-Centered Learning,” notes that increasing classroom spaces allows for more learning resources and less clutter. Subsequently, a more accessible and tidier environment can increase students’ attention to instruction and better support perception, memory, and reasoning. (p. 40)

Improving school facilities also has a positive impact on the physical health of students and staff. For instance, the authors of “The Third Teacher: 79 Ways You Can Use Design to Transform Teaching & Learning” point to research that found improved indoor air quality led to a 38.5% reduction of people experiencing asthmatic symptoms. (p. 26)

There are a lot more studies that support the many benefits of improved school facilities. I wanted to point a few of them out for you here for the simple reason that this building project was more than just a physical improvement. There are direct benefits for the teaching and learning that occur in our school. It is an investment not just in the facilities, but also in creating better opportunities for kids.

With this in mind, I want to say thank you for supporting the referendum. I believe the renovation and addition will have a positive influence on all learners, this year and beyond. 🗨️

## A Student Perspective



“One of the best parts of my job is sharing what I do with others.” said Options in Education Coordinator Amanda Heisner. “The program that we have created allows students an alternative way to complete their academic work and reach graduation. It’s about more than just the curriculum, and it’s always great when students are willing to share their experiences with others. The following was written by a

student who was new to the program this school year. I think their experience is similar to many students and families who experience Options for the first time.”

The Options in Education program is a lot different than you think! When people think of Options they might think bad things but that isn’t the case at all. At first I was a little nervous and I thought the same thing other people think. It is nothing like that at all! When I think of Options I think of a very helpful workspace. I go out there to get my work done, and if I need any help there are teachers I can get it from. You can have your own little area to work on things and you don’t

have to talk to anyone if you don’t want to, but the people out here are very nice and welcoming. It is very nice inside, there are places to sit everywhere and there is a kitchen where you can make your lunch and breakfast. There is also a room to exercise and a room to work on whatever you want like painting, using the Cricut, and wood work. I really like the big bean bag chairs, so I sit in them everyday. It feels like sitting at home and working on your work with a little help from the teachers. The teachers push you to get your work done but you also have a lot of freedom. You can take breaks throughout the day, which is really nice. Every Friday if it’s nice outside we go down to the park and eat our lunch. I asked some of the students what they liked about Options and they said, “We love everything about it.” Another student said, “It’s a very comfortable and an easy space to work in.” All the students really enjoy it at Options, and it provides a great learning opportunity in a comfortable setting. 🗨️

### Relationships Create Happiness



I recently watched an episode of "Ted: Ideas Worth Spreading" entitled "Robert Waldinger: What Makes a Good Life? Lessons From the Longest Study on Happiness" and was reminded of the importance that relationships have in our lives. At the time of this Ted Talk, Robert Waldinger was the Director of the Harvard Study of Adult Development, an ongoing 75 year study that tracked the

lives of 724 men. The results of this study reinforced that good relationships keep us happy and healthier; that the quality of our relationships matter, not the quantity; and that good relationships protect both our bodies and our brains.

During this ongoing covid pandemic, the importance of relationships has been reinforced to both students and adults. Our staff places an emphasis on building relationships with our students, but the relationships with parents and community members are just as important. # Psychologist's Thoughts

## F.A.S.T.



As a way to build community, connection, and the family unit our school has invested in being a Families and Schools Together (FAST) Site. This past fall, we had seven elementary school families participate in FAST for eight weeks. Throughout our time together we followed a routine. Each FAST evening starts with a meal. The first week the meal is planned by the FAST team, but then each week after it is planned and occasionally cooked by one of the families in the group. We had everything from barbeque with mac and cheese to taco dogs, and some amazing s'mores cookies! There's something magical about sharing a meal and seeing families in more of their natural environment together.

Once families finish eating they participate in a drawing activity and then a game of charades with emotions flash cards. We then all get together to share in a chant for FAST and break up into a parent group and a child group. After parents and children have their separate time, one parent has special play with one of their children for 15 minutes. During this time, the parent is encouraged to let the child lead the play and not take over (which as adults, we know can be a challenge!). This is often the kids' favorite time of the evening. The evening commences with a new family winning a prize basket (with items specifically chosen for their family), special announcements shared by parents (children are encouraged to tell their parents so that the adult is the one sharing out), and a special chant we refer to as Rain.

Experiencing FAST for the first time this fall was a heartwarming experience. We had community leaders that have led this program many years in a row, taking myself and another new to FAST teacher under their wing. We also had past staff members come back and mentor us to support the transition process to ensure FAST runs smoothly. In addition to the FAST team, the families were incredibly understanding and flexible in their thinking when we had to pivot to deliver meals and zoom check-ins while most families were in quarantine. We also developed comradery as we all laughed together in an attempt to sing the "FAST Song" which challenged all of our vocal chords (we soon altered this plan to a FAST chant instead). This program not only creates memories but also bridges connections, resources, and friendships.

MPES families can watch for more information next fall to learn if this program might be a fit for your family. 🗨️

# 2021 Report Card Release

After a two year hiatus, the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction has released state report cards, based on 2020-21 school data.

The Mineral Point Unified School District has scored an 82.8, which places it into the Exceeds Expectations category, a four star ranking.

This score places the District in the top ten percent of school districts in the state.



“After a chaotic school year, I think the report card scores demonstrate the quality of education that all of our students receive. Even though it is just a snapshot, this is wonderful for all of our staff and students to continue scoring at this level,” said Superintendent Mitch Wainwright.

Breaking down the District by building, the following scores were achieved:



Elementary: 86.4, Significantly Exceeds Expectations



Middle: 83.8, Significantly Exceeds Expectations



High: 76.9, Exceeds Expectations

Report cards are issued on four priority areas:

- ✓ Achievement
- ✓ Growth
- ✓ Target Group Outcomes
- ✓ On-track to Graduation

Scoring categories are: Significantly Exceeds Expectations (five stars) 83-100; Exceeds Expectations (four stars) 70-82.9, Meets Expectations (three stars) 58-69.9, Meets Few Expectations (two stars) 48-57.9, Fails to Meet Expectations (one star) 0-47.9.

## 1829 “PROUD OF OUR PAST. FOCUSED ON OUR FUTURE.”

All staff and students received this year’s Ashirt design, which pays homage to our history as one of the oldest schools in the State of Wisconsin. See the excerpt from “History of Iowa County” published 1881: “The first school in the county was taught at Mineral Point in 1829 by Mrs. Harker and Beulah Lamb. The attendance numbered eight pupils, whose facilities for mastering the simple rudiments of the English language were plain beyond description. The schoolhouse was a wretched log cabin, with rough-hewn timber walls. The seats were made by inserting four wooden pegs in slabs of timber. The floor was composed of rough, puncheons, and pens and ink were novelties beyond the flightiest imagination. With the institution of a school, the highway was paved for the reception of the arts and sciences.”



# District Earns State Communication Awards

Brunson and Alex Welsh, and our School Psychologist, Katelyn Oellerich. You may be wondering “Why is social-emotional learning important?”


According to CASEL (Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning), “When students have supportive relationships and opportunities to develop and practice social, emotional, and cognitive skills across many different contexts, academic learning accelerates (<https://casel.org/>).” Social-emotional learning encompasses skills that help students be successful as they become college and career ready.

There are five key skills to social emotional learning:

- ♥ Self-Awareness (understanding one’s own emotions, personal goals, and values)
- ♥ Self-Management (skills and attitudes that facilitate the ability to regulate one’s own emotions and behaviors)
- ♥ Responsible Decision Making (learning how to make constructive choices about personal behavior and social interactions across diverse settings)
- ♥ Social Awareness (ability to understand, empathize, and feel compassion for those with different backgrounds or cultures)
- ♥ Relationship Skills (establish and maintain healthy and rewarding relationships)

These skills are important for many areas of life that will serve students well beyond school, helping them succeed as adults. To help put a focus on mental health and social-emotional learning, the Mineral Point Unified School District applied for, and received, a Mental Health Grant from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction focused mainly at the middle school level. The goals of the grant over the next two years include:

- ♥ Decrease the number of students in grades 6-8 who identify they rarely or never get help when they need it.
- ♥ Decrease the number of students in grades 6-8 who report experiencing symptoms of either anxiety, depression, or self-harm and decrease the number of students who report they do not have a teacher they can confide in or a person they could go to in order to talk about a problem.



Some of the work that our middle and high school pupil services team has done this year includes: conducted social-emotional screening for 6th grade students, relationship mapping, implemented classroom SEL lessons in 6th grade, created a SEL committee at the middle school, developed a referral pathway for staff to refer students when staff are concerned about a student around academic, social-emotional, or behavioral needs, conducted individual student meetings, worked with families and collaborated with mental health providers. We still have much more to do this year to support social-emotional learning and look forward to a great school year. 
## School Board Candidates

## Burreson Hall of Fame

Congrats to Mineral Point High School Boys Basketball Coach Dan Burreson who was inducted into the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in Wisconsin Dells! He is pictured here with Bob Buck, his high school coach.

Dan Burreson, the son of Clare and Anne Burreson, is the seventh of eight children. He graduated from Dodgeville High School in 1979. At Dodgeville, Dan participated in football, basketball, and American Legion baseball. His 1977-78 Dodgeville basketball team won the Southern 8 Conference title under Hall of Fame Coach Bob Buck. He was captain of the 1978-79 Dodgers. Dan later attended UW-Platteville where he received his undergraduate degree in 1987. Later, he would earn his Master's at Morningside in 2011.



He began his basketball coaching career in the Dodgeville School District coaching at the 7th, 8th, and 9th grade levels in the fall of 1983 with the encouragement of Coach Buck. He would then coach for four years at UW-Platteville under the legendary Bo Ryan, including the first conference title under Ryan in 1987-88 and the National Championship team in 1990-91. In the fall of 1990, he began teaching at Mineral Point High School where he has remained ever since. He would join the Mineral Point boys' basketball coaching staff under Jim Bennett, an outstanding high school coach.

In 1995, Dan began his journey as the head boys' basketball coach at Mineral Point where he has remained for the past 26 years. During that time, his teams have earned six conference titles and five regional championships. His 2015 team brought home the state silver ball in Division 4. For twenty years he was also the baseball coach at Mineral Point. His baseball teams won three conference titles and six regional titles, reaching the sectional final three times.

Dan has been an active member of the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches' Association. He has been on the Executive Board for over twenty years, has served as WBCA President from 2015 to 2017, Boys' All-Star Chairman for ten years, and is currently the Hall of Fame Selection Chairperson. In 2013, he was honored with the WBCA Tribute Award and in 2019 was the first recipient of the WBCA Legacy Award.

Coach Burreson would like to thank his assistant coaches, his athletic director for the past 26 years Vickie Dahl, the Mineral Point community, but mostly his players for making this all possible. For 26 years he has been able to coach not only outstanding players, but outstanding individuals as well.

Finally, Dan would like to thank the WBCA for this honor and for their commitment to the game of basketball in the state of Wisconsin. 🗨️


