

All funds earned will help defray costs of field trips, speakers, classroom supplies, and various activities for the middle school throughout the year.







Middle School Students Survey Results on Bullying and School Climate

In the fall of this year our 7th and 8th grade students took the Youth Risk Behavior Survey, along with students from most of the schools in the Cesa 3 area. The questions on this survey dealt with risky behavior, safety and wellness issues and the results are intended to help our counties develop programs to help teens navigate safely through these years. One aspect of safety and wellness is how students feel about how they are treated while in school.

To help assess that situation for our middle school students we pulled out six questions that related directly to bullying and school pulled out two additional questions that addressed depression and suicidal thoughts. Although there are a myriad of factors that contribute to depression and suicidal ideation, how one is treated in school and a sense of belonging is highly correlated.

We then asked the sixth graders the same eight questions to help create a total picture. 124 students responded to these questions. Below are the results of those survey questions. All results are reported in percentages and the data is for MP Middle School only.

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1. How often do you feel safe and secure at school?

This means that 19 of our middle school student don't feel safe most of the time in our buildings. Although I did not give you gender results they do show that boys feel less safe than girls.

2. Do you agree or disagree that harassment and bullying by students is a problem at our school?

This means that only 39 of our 124 students feel that harassment and bullying is NOT a problem in our schools. More girls felt it was a problem than boys.

3. Has anyone at school ever touched you, said something to you, or displayed a picture or photograph that was sexual in nature and make you feel uncomfortable?

This means that 14 of our middle schoolers have been made to feel uncomfortable in this manner. More girls reported this than boys.

4. Has anyone ever stolen or deliberately damaged your property such as a cell phone, clothing, or books while on school property?

This means that 24 of our middle school students have had property stolen or destroyed deliberately. This behavior occurred more often to boys.

5. Have you ever been electronically bullied? (include e-mail, chat rooms, instant messaging, web sites or texting)

This means 22 of our middle school students have been bullied in this way. This behavior occurs more often among girls.

6. Do you agree or disagree that your school has clear rules and consequences for behaviors?

This means that 33 of our 124 students are unsure of our school rules and consequences.

7. Have you ever felt so sad or hopeless almost every day for two weeks or more in a row that you stopped doing some usual activities?

Declined to answer	15.40%	0	4.90%

This means that 15 of our middle school students could be struggling with some degree of depression. This was true of more girls than boys.

8. Have you ever seriously thought about killing yourself?

This means that 16 of our middle school students have contemplated suicide. Boys reported a higher incidence of this than girls.

I find these results unacceptable and scary. We obviously have a lot of work to do in teaching our young people how to treat each other and also how to be resilient in the face of poor treatment. Just as a pebble dropped in water spreads ripples outwards, our treatment of others creates ripples that affect those around us and eventually come back to us.

Parents, please encourage your child to create positive ripples while at school and stop negative ripples with a positive comment.

Students, please spread ripples of kindness, those ripples will come back to you. Stop others from creating negative ripples.

Staff, lets make sure our students are aware of our expectations when it comes to how they treat each other and let's stop those negative ripples in their wake.

Together we can make a difference. 🐾

Extreme Book Reports & Rockets:


The sixth grade enrichment group did some extreme book reports. The sixth grade enrichment students divided into groups with the assignment to create the ultimate extreme book report. They designed three dimensional posterboards, showed videos, created their own videos with rap and created claymations. One group even used Minecraft to report from the Nether. Then they blew up their entire creation as a grand finale. Students did an extreme job reporting on some very interesting books. Additionally the sixth grade enrichment group also shot off some rockets. The rockets were fueled by water and sodium bicarbonate (antacid). Rocket's were made from plastic pop or water bottles with a cork. Students created many cool designs. Most rockets flew up about ten feet. 🐾

Earth Day

Eighth grade students are asked to bring garden tools to aid in the process. They are also asked to bring long sleeves, long pants, closed toe shoes, and gloves for the activity that day. We hope these activities and events will remind students to be conscious of the environment, not only on Earth Day, but everyday throughout the year. 🐾

On April 22, Earth Day was celebrated around the world. On Earth Day and throughout the week, Mineral Point Middle School participated with a variety of activities.
