Mineral Point Elementary Principal & Director of Pupil Services

The Farm to School initiative has three main goals which include: promoting childrens' health by providing fresh, minimally processed foods in schools; strengthening childrens' and our community's knowledge about agricul-



ture, food, nutrition and the environment; and to strengthen local economies by expanding markets for Wisconsin's agricultural producers.

How is the Mineral Point School District involved in the Farm to School initiative? We are working with our food service program to begin sharing a monthly Farm to School product that students sample during lunch. These same products will eventually be featured in the schools'

menus. Our current food suppliers already have many local food source connections.

Next, community volunteers are stepping forward to support the start of an elementary school garden; the produce grown will be served in our school lunch program. We have been approached by the Southwest Regional Planning Commission at UW-Platteville to write a partner grant that supports an Americorp volunteer here in the Mineral Point School District. This person's role would be to support a district-wide garden program, assist with educating students about nutrition and the environment, and to serve as a liaison between the school and local agricultural businesses. Our district Wellness Committee is hosting a childrens' summer triathlon; the proceeds from this event will serve to fund an Americorp worker.

What is Mineral Point 2020? Last week, a small group of people gathered to discuss the community needs and issues around the Farm to School initiative. Mineral Point 2020 will be an ongoing effort to connect families, food producers, and local businesses now and in the future. What if the Referendum Fails? By Luke Francois

 \mathbf{I} want to provide some insight as to what is at stake on April 3rd. Like so many school districts in Wisconsin, we are in a crisis situation. We are asking voters to cast their ballot for \$1.1 million annually to keep the school functioning as it currently does. Let me explain why I describe our situation as a crisis and what would happen if the April 3rd referendum fails.

Jobs Would Be Lost

Our projected annual budget for 2013 is \$8.39 million (which is the same as the budget for the current year). Cutting \$1.1 million from the \$8.39 million budget is a reduction of 13%. To cut \$1.1 million, we will essentially need to reduce staffing by approximately 20%, because 30% of the budget are fixed costs and 66% of our budget is staffing. Your school district employs 125 people, many of whom live here in town. If the referendum fails, close to 25 district employees will lose their jobs.

Problem With Hoping For A Second-Chance Referendum

I heard it suggested that if the referendum fails, the district could simply ask for another referendum for either a lesser recurring amount or a non-recurring referendum. Not only has the School Board made no such decision, but given the timing, the district will have no choice but to go forward with a reduction in force if the April 3rd referendum fails.

A recently passed law (Senate Bill 2) requires that by May 1st the district must send teachers a preliminary notice of nonrenewal if there's a possibility they will be let go in a reduction in force. If the notice is not given, then teacher contracts automatically renew and the district would be obligated to pay the teachers for 2012-13. So, if the referendum fails, the district has a limited window to determine which teachers will be retained and which will be non-renewed since staffing for the coming school year is set in place by July 1st.

If the school board decided to have a second referendum which it has not done - the earliest possible date to hold it would be August 14th, which is six weeks after the district's non-renewal decisions. So, the suggestion that the current

referendum should be bypassed in favor of the vaque possibility of a second referendum ignores the harsh reality that the failure of the April 3rd referendum will have a devastating effect on our workforce. It will force the district to non-renew valued teachers who will then look for work elsewhere.

Recurring Safeguards for Recurring Referendum

Please rest assured that this recurring referendum will not give the district a blank check to act frivolously. Each and every year going forward, your locally elected school board needs to vote on whether to use that money. The public is invited to attend the levy-setting meeting which takes place in November. You can express your approval or disapproval of the budget and the tax levy before it is set. And, if years from now the state aid for public schools increases, state imposed revenue caps will require the school board to lower the tax levy accordingly.

You have an administration and a school board committed to keeping costs down and keeping your property taxes down. For example, even if the referendum passes we will lower the budget after the first year by making spending cuts. We will remain vigilant in looking for efficiencies, regardless of the referendum's outcome. And to help the public feel comfortable with the recurring aspect of this referendum, your school board is in the process of setting forth policies that require the district, and future boards, to act with fiscal restraint, every year, on a recurring basis.

Our goal is to remain a beacon of educational excellence. That is what our citizens and students have come to expect, and we feel, is our duty to provide. Our mission is to provide opportunities that help all of our students reach their academic and personal potential. We believe that we will not merely endure but prevail through this difficult and uncertain time. The referendum question is a critical question before the community.

Hitting the Books

READ 180 is an intensive, reading intervention program used in 15,000 classrooms across the U.S. In 2010, the Mineral Point School District was fortunate in being able to use Federal Stimulus funds to purchase the program and to train staff in its' implementation. Without this money, our district would not have been able to afford this program.

"Read 180 has helped me by making me a better speller. It also helped me find the courage to write the book that I always wanted to write."

The program consists of the latest topic software that contains high-interest videos that emphasize content area topics. Each is designed to motivate students and build a background for reading. The software tracks progress in comprehension, fluency, spelling and vocabulary. The program also involves teacher directed classroom instruction and independent reading using wonderful paperbacks and audio books. The students work for a 90 minute block of time. The ultimate goal of READ 180 is for students to be able to read grade level material independently, with confidence and fluency in all subject areas.

Since September 2010, over 50 students, grade 6-12, have participated in the program. The results so far have been exciting, with many students who were reading at least two years below grade level, all making excellent progress and many becoming proficient. The program is intense but the motivation to be a stronger reader is evident in all students involved.

"From my point-of-view, I really like Read 180 because it helps your reading level and forces you to learn things. When I first started in this class I thought I wouldn't like it. That all changed after a few weeks. When I started my reading level was really low but after a few months, my reading level is at grade level. Having 20 minutes of silent reading does help, I thought I would never read, but I have already finished 5 books."



Creating Fine Arts

They were able to create 200 valentines and delivered them to our local Madison Veterans' Hospital.

We would also like to celebrate the accomplishments of some of our very talented students. On February 18th our high school students competed at the Tri-state Regional High School Art Exhibit. There were 10 participating schools from the tri-state area, with each school eligible to enter 4 pieces of artwork. Out of the 40 pieces of art work, Mineral Point had 2 students, Todd Tibbits and Emily Ramsey, place in the top ten to go onto the state level in Madison. Celebrating School Breakfast Week

National School Breakfast Week was held March 5-9. During this week a "Taste of School Breakfasts" allowed free samplings of what our district is offering for school break-



fast. Elementary students enjoyed story time reading from Grandparent volunteers as well while enjoying their complimentary samples of the "Taste of School Breakfasts."

The School Breakfast Program requires each school to meet federal dietary guidelines which dictate no more than 30 percent of calories from fat and less than 10 percent

from saturated fat. Each breakfast must provide 1/4 of the recommended daily allowance of protein, Vitamin A, Vitamin C, iron, calcium, and calories. School meals must be served in age appropriate portions as well. School meals are healthier than ever before with the addition of fresh fruits and veggies, whole grains, reduced sodium, low fat dairy, reduced or zero trans fats, and baked items rather than fried.

Research shows that students who eat breakfast perform much better academically, have better test scores on test days, feel better with less absenteeism and perform better physically. This annual celebration of the School Breakfast Program was established in 1989. It gives schools an opportunity to highlight the importance of the breakfast program and the benefits to starting the student's day off right.

Currently, breakfast costs \$1.25 and is only payable through the student's food service account. There is one hot breakfast option and two cold breakfast options offered each day. The hot breakfast changes each day while the cold options remain the same. Questions regarding breakfasts or the school lunch program can be directed to cindy.roalfs@mp.k12.wi.us.

Budget Timeline By Luke Francois

The budget development process this year is more challenging than in other years as preliminary work needs to prepare for two scenarios dependent on the outcome of the April 3rd referendum. An approved budget by the board on May 14 is also time sensitive to address any required staffing reductions. Under the law it is required that renewal notices be received no later than May 15 of each year and teachers must return their contracts no later than June 15. The District will meet frequently with the finance committee and board to prepare the budget. Please find the budget development timeline below.

2012-13 Budget Development Timeline

March 2012

- Hold budget informational/engagement sessions with staff
- Begin process of identifying and refining potential budget reductions, efficiencies, reprioritizations and new/enhanced revenue potential
- Review staffing for inclusion in the 2012-13 preliminary budget

April 2012

- Solicit input / feedback on budget discussion items & budget strategies with finance committee
- Finalize staffing for inclusion in the 2012 13 preliminary budget

May 2012

- Present budget plan proposal to BOE
- Approve budget plan [BOE] May 14, 2012
- Begin to implement actions resulting from approved budget plan






July 2012

- Review initial draft of 2013-13 preliminary budget with Finance Committee and BOE
- Approve 2012-13 preliminary budget [BOE]

October 2012

 Adopt 2012-13 budget and certify tax levy [BOE] – October 8, 2012
