Today, not only do the students get report cards, but the schools and school districts get one as well. This report card represents the scores our students receive on statewide tests. For elementary and middle schools, the exam is the Wisconsin Forward Exam and is given to every third through eighthgrader. It tests math and reading for all of those grades and adds science and social

studies for fourth and eighth grade. In high school, freshmen and sophomores take the ACT Aspire exam, sophomores take the social studies section of the Forward exam, and juniors take the ACT exam. Each building level is given a grade based on how the respective students did on those exams. Then the district receives a grade that compiles those scores.

I am proud to report that for the fourth year in a row, the Mineral Point Unified School District is a 5-star rated school district. We received the top rating, "Significantly Exceeds" state standards. Mineral Point is one of three school districts in this part of the state to receive that rating!

This report card score is the result of a great deal of effort by many people. The teachers and support staff deserve a huge amount of credit for all of the education and support they give to all our students. The students deserve credit for working hard and putting in the time to learn new material. They allow their minds to grow and explore new ideas. Parents deserve some of the credit also. Helping your children learn the value of a good education, bringing them to school each day, and providing whatever support you can at home, helps to make the job of an educator easier. Finally, to all of the community members that support the school--you provide us with space, materials, and the resources we need to do the best possible job we can. While there is a report card score is tied directly to each building, and one to the district as a whole, the Mineral Point community plays a big part in the success.

#### Middle School Mentions

Vickie Dahl, Middle School Principal, Athletic Director



The Project Lead The Way (PLTW) curriculum is a hit among our middle school students. Mr. Chuck Smet is in his second year at Mineral Point Middle School and the PLTW classes have been very popular at MPMS.

Through modeling and design, coding and robotics, flight and

space, students are engaged in PLTW classroom activities. These activities enable students to develop skills like problem solving, critical and creative thinking, communication, and perseverance.

The 6th graders are starting to work on the skimmer project; this is an activity that teaches technical drawing skills, as well as measurement skills. The activity that attracts the most attention for the 6th graders is the egg crash vehicle; this activity is designed to teach engineering problem solving skills. One of the activities that we are looking forward to is the 3D printing and solid modeling; the students will be able to make their own name tag that can be put on their backpack or key chain.

The 7th graders are learning about mechanical devices; they have done this by building a vehicle using the maker cart. 7th grade students will be building an automated robot that is faster than all of their classmates; this is done by using knowledge learned in previous lessons, involving gears and motors.

The 8th graders are working on several different lessons this quarter. The project that draws the most interest is the cutting board that each student can take home. This project includes learning about traditional tools and equipment. Learning about flight is also an area that grabs the students' attention as they get to make there own airplanes out of available materials. One of the areas that will affect these students in their future is the idea of coding; they are able to code a physical device and get it to move forward, backward, and turn right and left. The final activity for 8th graders is the "battle" using a remote control robot in which they try and get an advantage over their competition.

## **Principal's Post**

"Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world." —Nelson Mandela

Much of history describes a balance of power: who has it and who does not. You could say history is a study of the constant imbalance of power. Wars begin and end, civilizations are built and fall, one event creates a tipping point for a larger movement.

Social studies typically focus on people, yet we live within the context of one's culture, our physical environments, and the society of the time. We are influenced by the world as well as being an influence on our world.

One could almost say "worlds" to emphasize that everyone has a distinct perspective on reality. Our beliefs and values sway what we see and how we see it. These filters give us a unique hue as we each view the same experience. Example: in the fable *Seven Blind Mice*, each mouse makes a false assumption as they interact with a part of an elephant's body, such as its tail ("It's a snake."). The point to be made here is that there are many shades of meaning we can construct about an event or an object, such as a given text to read and understand in school.

This line of thinking leads to a question: should we embrace different ways of seeing the world and facilitate a deeper understanding through student discussion and inquiry? Or, do we guide students toward one right answer? Many of us would likely embrace the former. But our past actions in education seems to show we have valued the latter.

Paulo Freire wrote about this challenge in *Pedagogy of the Oppressed*. He rallied against the "banking model of education", in which students are seen as reservoirs for information regardless of the accuracy or source of knowledge. Past content standards and standardized testing reinforced this instructional approach. "Columbus discovered America in 1492" is an example, a day of recognition common in many schools. Few would question this.

And yet if a teacher and students read *Encounter* by Jane Yolen and David Shannon together, which describes the arrival of Columbus and his crew from the perspective of the Taini people on San Salvador, this time in history no longer looks or feels the same. (Several members of that community were enslaved by the crew.) Students might start to relate to todays' events with issues of the past. Minds expand as they consider other ways of seeing the world.

Peter Johnston, author of *Opening Minds*, describes this process as "perspective taking", in which we can socially imagine what it might be like for someone else. This capacity for empathy can lead to compassion, in which we take these new understandings and put them into action in order to improve the situation for others.

So, where do we begin? Maybe through themes, such as students examining "injustice" as a common thread throughout our nation's history. From this perspective, social studies transforms from a march through facts to a vehicle for advocacy.

We have always participated in physical education activities and life skills lessons that are community-based.

New this year is our focus on being of service to our community.

This school year both morning and afternoon students volunteer once a month at the Mineral Point Care Center. These experiences have allowed students to learn from residents, plan activities, and assist residents in creative and recreational activities. Our monthly visits have become a favorite of both students and residents.

Another opportunity to be of service presented itself this year. Our Mineral Point veterans are quite busy on Veteran's Day, as they participate in three programs throughout the day. This busy schedule led us to the idea that we could be of service by hosting the veterans for lunch. On November 11, we hosted around 20 veterans at Options. We served soup, sandwiches, drinks, and homemade pie. We also provided thank you treat bags for the veterans to take with them. For most, this was their first time in our building. We shared a little about Options in Education and were blessed with a story about overcoming adversity from one of the veterans. He shared his story about not completing high school and the path his life took from that decision. He went on to say that he has accomplished great things but encouraged the students to continue on their path to graduation. The students were touched by this genuine interaction. We are hoping this is the beginning of an annual tradition that will grow over time.

**E**very school district has the task of ensuring their graduates are college and career ready, but for students with a disability, that preparation includes activities that rely upon school, community, and agency collaboration. As a member of the Iowa and Lafayette County Communities on Transition, our school participates in several collaborative programs that provide transition opportunities for our

students in the areas of post-secondary education, community participation, vocational training, independent living, continuing and adult education, employment, and adult agencies.

- Disability Mentoring Day focuses on building the knowledge of our students about local businesses and potential careers. Students visit three businesses per year of interest. This allows the students to get a first-hand look at the types of skill sets, postsecondary education, and training opportunities that are required for each job. Guest speakers talk about the important soft skills needed to be a good employee. Students are encouraged to choose new businesses each year so they get a wide variety of job opportunities in local southwest Wisconsin.
- Career Prep and Life Skills Day allows students to learn about valuable resources and services that are available to them. Sessions have provided information about the Youth Apprenticeship program, Healthy Lifestyles, Healthy Eating, Financial Advising, the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, the Aging Disability and Resource Center, Hodan Community Center, School Counseling advice, cyber footprint, UW-Platteville, Southwest Wisconsin Technical College, and the Military.
- Recreational Education and Exploration Day was created to allow students with disabilities to experience lifelong recreational activities in a fun laid back setting at Governor Dodge. Students enjoy hiking, critter catching, fishing, yard games, and barbecuing. This event is a great social event for students that may have a hard time communicating or have behavior challenges.

In addition to these programs, our high school special education teachers and staff are working to build our community partnerships with area businesses. By connecting our students and local businesses we hope to support students in a diverse number of work-based learning options including job shadowing, service/volunteer learning, local internships, co-ops, training programs, school-based enterprises, entrepreneurship, supervised agricultural experiences, Department of Public Instruction skill standards programs and Youth Apprenticeships.

Our goal is to make sure all students leave with the knowledge, skills, and habits they need to reach their goals and return as a member of the Pointer Nation community that wants to give back the same way to the next group of students.

## **Psychologist's Thoughts**

As demands for our attention continue to grow, being able to focus and be present in the current moment is becoming especially important. Mindfulness is a concept you may be hearing more about from your students, as it's a strategy that our staff is working to incorporate more into the classroom setting. Studies have shown that the use of mindfulness practices

can relate to increased focus and attention, reduced stress, improved emotion regulation, and improved teacher/student relationships (Jennings, 2015; Napoli, Krech, &Holley, 2005).

So, what is mindfulness? Mindfulness is the practice of bringing your awareness to the present moment in an open, non-judging, non-reactive, and accepting way (Brown & Ryan, 2003). Often, we are not completely aware in the present moment and tend to get lost in our thoughts by thinking about what happened earlier in the day, worrying about something that we need to get done, or maybe thinking about something that will be happening later. In addition to our thoughts tending to wander, many of us are quick to judge and/or react to our thoughts. Why did I just say that? I just got a notification for a text, I better leave what I'm doing and check it now! When we are doing these things, we are not fully in the present moment and may feel more stressed, less focused, and disengaged.

Today, our children are involved in so many different activities, and technology is always at our fingertips. It can be easy to avoid, become distracted, or disengage from what is happening in the moment. Some strategies that promote mindfulness include breath awareness, yoga, and sensorimotor awareness activities. In school, teachers have been utilizing mindfulness-based strategies to support in the ease of transitions from one activity to the next, as a tool to support with emotion regulation, and to promote overall feeling of well-being in our students. The more that mindfulness techniques are practiced, the more our brains begin to focus in the present without so much effort. Mindfulness takes patience, practice, and time but can help to support in our overall well-being.

All entries were judged on a 30-point scale in six areas: goals and objectives, research and planning, execution and evaluation, results, language, and design.

WSPRA is a state affiliate of the National School Public Relations Association (NSPRA). The mission of WSPRA is to expand the capacity of its members to provide effective communication management for the purpose of strengthening educational opportunities for all students.

## All MP Schools Earn Five Star Report Card Rating

The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction has released state report cards, based on 2018-19 school data.

The Mineral Point Unified School District has scored an 86.4, which places it into the Significantly Exceeds Expectations category, a five star rating.

This is the fourth year in a row the District has received the prestigious five star rating.

For the first time, each Mineral Point school and the district as a whole earned the five star rating.

Breaking down the district by building, the following scores were achieved:



**Elementary: 86.1** Significantly Exceeds Expectations (five stars)

#### **★** Middle: 83.0

Significantly Exceeds Expectations (five stars)

High: 83.1 Significantly Exceeds Expectations (five stars)

Report cards are issued on four priority areas:

- Student Achievement
- District/School Growth
- Closing Gaps
- On-Track and Postsecondary Readiness

Out of 421 districts in the state, only 40 received the five star rating that Mineral Point received.

Scoring categories are: Significantly Exceeds Expectations (five stars) 83-100; Exceeds Expectations (four stars) 73-82.9, Meets Expectations (three stars) 63-72.9, Meets Few Expectations (two stars) 53-62.9, Fails to Meet Expectations (one star) 0-52.9.

## **Helping Hallways and Calming Corners**

In the Mineral Point Elementary School teachers take education and focus very seriously. They also think that all students should get a break once in a while. That's why we now have new ways to get that essential break. Sensory hallways and a Calming Corner!

Sensory hallways, or as we call it the "Pointer Path" let students do various actions like hopscotch, reaching to the vibrantly colored stars taped to the wall, bear crawling, and streaming your hand on the pieces of tape in a wavy motion.

The Calming Corner is located on the main floor so it is largely used by kindergarten through second grade students. It is a private space in the hallway closed off by a curtain. One student can use this space at a time. When they enter, they identify how they're feeling, then choose a tool (such as coloring, a fidget toy, or resting.) The teacher gives the student a sand timer. When the time is up they choose how their body feels after taking some time to pause. Then they return to class.

The Calming Corner and Pointer Path have made a change in our students' focus and attitude. They both provide a great break for children's brains and help them refocus on what they need to be doing in class. I personally, have used the sensory hallway as a tool to re-group myself when my body is feeling energetic. While some students prefer to follow the actions quickly, I like to go through the movements slowly and really pay attention to how my body moves throughout the course. This way of moving through the Pointer Path helps my body feel more calm before I return to the classroom.



The School Board election will be held Tuesday, April 7, 2020. The term of office for these school board members begins Monday, April 27, 2020. The top two vote recipients will serve three year terms, with the third place vote recipient serving a two year term.

Incumbents whose seats are up for re-election include Jeff Basting, Tony Dahl, and Gary Sullivan. If these incumbents do not wish to run, they need to file noncandidacy no later than 5:00 pm Friday, December 27 in the District Office.

For all interested candidates (including incumbents), a Campaign Finance Registration Statement and a Declaration of Candidacy must be filed no later than 5:00 pm Tuesday, January 7, 2020 in the District Office located at 705 Ross Street.

If a primary is necessary, that will be held Tuesday, February 18, 2020. (A primary would be necessary only if there were seven or more candidates seeking the three available seats.)


#### **Local Business Recognition**






